LOOKING BACK: THE PRESIDENT'S REFLECTION

As I reflect back on the year that is now behind us, I can see that the Caring and Sharing Exchange (C&SE) achieved many successes. Here are just a few of the highlights:

- The Ottawa's Biggest Bake Sale Event increased its revenue by 12% over the previous year.
- The Running on Empties initiative at Ottawa Beer Stores celebrated its 25th Anniversary with a 52% increase in dollars raised.
- Together with our partner Agencies, the C&SE Co-ordination Service identified duplicate applications which saved the community the equivalent of an incredible \$616,000 last year alone!
- We became the new home of Kind Ottawa and the Kindness Week Initiative - a natural fit for C&SE!
- We secured a grant of software through NetSuite (worth more than \$26,000) that will replace all of our current systems, and most importantly will provide us with a new Co-ordination Service database that will be more efficient for our staff and the 300 partner agencies that we work with.

At this AGM, the Board of Directors has selected five directors for approval. Those nominated are: Wayne Crutchlow, Jose Lazo, Erin Johnstone, Dr. Andrea Lee and Brent Percival. I look forward to working with the 2013 Board of Directors.

C&SE is funded 100% through the generosity of individuals, businesses and foundations. We look forward to continuing to strengthen our relationships with our donors, including exploring new ways of giving. We will also continue to work with our partner agencies to strengthen our Co-ordination Service and ensure that our program delivery is as efficient as possible. We will strive to build new partnerships with a view to further our mission.

With our 100th Anniversary just two short years away, the future for C&SE looks bright. We look forward to further enhancing our programs by staying true to our mission and taking into consideration the ever-changing needs of the Greater Ottawa community. As always, we will continue our focus of equitably assisting those in need at key times of the year and ensuring that dollars stretch as far as they can by the elimination of duplications of service.

ON HER FIRST ANNIVERSARY: EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

June of 2013 marks my first full year as the Executive Director of the Caring and Sharing Exchange (C&SE). If there is one thing that has impressed me it is the level of commitment and dedication that the staff, the Board of Directors and each of our 316 volunteers have for this organization. I want to thank all those individuals for making my first year on the job very rewarding. I am also grateful to Tim Wong, who served as Interim Executive Director and made my transition into this position much smoother.

During the year, I have had the pleasure to meet many of our Partner Agencies that share the same passion in helping those in need in the most efficient and cost-effective way as we do. I have heard stories from individuals who have been helped through the services we provide. There is one story that always warms my heart:

Kathryn was always on the giving end, at Christmas time she would knit baby stockings for the neonatal unit and prepare Christmas hampers for those in need. She also sponsored 3 foster children and 15 elderly people and she still continues to do what she can to help out. In 2002, a tragic three-story fall left her a parapalegic. Despite feeling ashamed she knew it was time to ask for help. She received a food hamper through the Christmas Exchange Program. Despite her situation, she shared that hamper with neighbours that remained on the waiting list. "I shared my food hamper with a senior who didn't get anything," Kathryn wrote in her thank you letter. "So your gift helped two families this Christmas."

The year 2013 also marked the year that C&SE became the new home of Kindness Week in Ottawa, co-founded by Rabbi Reuven Bulka and United Way Ottawa. What a remarkable week we had! We watched a multi-faith committee welcome surprised arrivals at the Ottawa Airport, the Youville Centre get an Extreme Makeover on their quiet room for young moms and people donating blood all in the name of kindness. We saw kindness spread across the city with local schools taking on their own Kindness Week initiatives and a group even giving out free hugs. C&SE hosted a charity fair at City Hall with special guest H el ene Campbell, we had the opportunity to recognize Ottawa's Emergency Workers, and so much more!

The week started off strong with an extremely successful launch event, held for the first time at Accora Village. Many community leaders spoke at the event, including Yasir Naqvi MPP Ottawa Centre, Bob Chiarelli MPP Ottawa-West Nepean, Mayor Jim Watson, Councillor Mathieu Fleury, Councillor Mark Taylor, Max Keeping and of course, Rabbi Reuven Bulka.

At the launch event, the Caring and Sharing Exchange took the opportunity to present Kindness Citations to representatives from Ottawa's police, fire and paramedic personnel in recognition of their commitment to the safety of the Ottawa community.

Later in the week, the Caring and Sharing Exchange hosted a charity fair at city hall, which brought a wide variety of organizations together under one roof. The public was invited to explore the various opportunities to assist these groups with their work through volunteering to help make Ottawa a better place to live.

At the event, special guest speaker H el ene Campbell spoke to attendees about the simple yet significant act of being an organ donor. Campbell was the recipient of a double-lung transplant and is the young woman behind the #BeAnOrganDonor campaign on Twitter. She is an inspiring member of the Ottawa community and has had an incredible impact on organ and tissue donor awareness. We were fortunate enough to have her at our event a mere two days after she appeared on the Ellen DeGeneres show, and as a result the charity fair received a great deal of media coverage.

On the last day of Kindness Week, local designer Sonya Kinkade and her team revealed their makeover of a room for moms at the Youville Centre. For the past three years, Kinkade and her team have chosen a local organization to be the recipient of an Extreme Makeover: Kindness Edition. All of the labour and materials are generously donated by local businesses and the community, as well as Kinkade herself.

Some of the other kind events that happened throughout the week included a weeklong blood drive with Canadian Blood Services, Family Day skates hosted by local politicians, a multi-faith welcoming committee at the Ottawa Airport, and surprise Community Builder Awards presented to H el ene Campbell and Yasir Naqvi MPP. Many more small third party events were held all over the city, with Accora Village hosting activities at their centre every day of the week and one new local group *Small Gestures Change Lives* even gave out free hugs downtown.

The Caring and Sharing Exchange’s first year with Kindness Week was a huge success overall. As an already well-established initiative it provided both us and our relatively new brand with a great deal of public exposure and media coverage. We are pleased to be the new home of Kindness Week, and look forward to spreading the seeds of kindness in Ottawa for many years to come.

TRADITION AND INNOVATION: OUR PROGRAMS' REPORT

THE CHRISTMAS EXCHANGE PROGRAM

The Christmas Exchange Program has a long history as the first direct-assistance program provided by the Caring and Sharing Exchange.

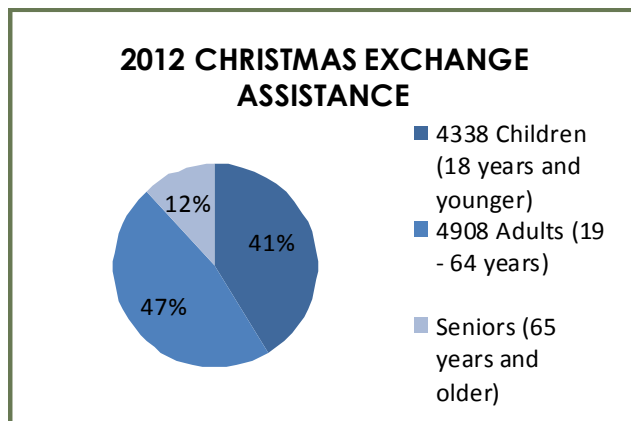
Born in 1915 under the Ottawa Welfare Bureau, the Christmas Exchange assistance program provides those in need with food hampers or redeemable gift vouchers during the holiday season. This program provides residents of the Greater Ottawa area with a sense of hope and dignity during an otherwise difficult time of year.

Kimberley, a new volunteer of the Christmas Exchange Program, revealed that she had received life-changing assistance from the Christmas Exchange 17 years ago.

"Nobody knew the stress I felt as a mother," Kimberley recalled, "trying to make sure my family always had what they needed while appearing like everything was fine. If you had seen my family that Christmas, you would have seen a normal family of four, having a normal, fun Christmas with full bellies and goodies on the table. And 'normal' felt pretty darn good!"

SHARING IN STUDENT SUCCESS

One in five children in Ottawa lives in poverty, yet children from low income families are required to have back-to-school necessities such as basic school supplies, backpacks, lunch kits and the required three pairs of shoes (in-door, out-door and gym).

The Caring and Sharing Exchange helps those children in need by either providing a redeemable gift voucher or a backpack stuffed with school supplies.

Children who are reduced to carrying supplies in a plastic bag and wearing torn shoes can easily become targets of **bullying and intimidation**. Children just want to fit in with their peers.

With the cost of living what it is today, our program will ease a lot of already-tight budgets and will ensure that children go back to school with their heads held high!

THE CO-ORDINATION SERVICE

Our Co-ordination Service is the backbone of the Caring and Sharing Exchange. As the reason for our organization's birth back in 1915, the Co-ordination Service we provide to the Ottawa community ensures the donor dollars being given to nearly 300 community organizations are being distributed evenly and fairly.

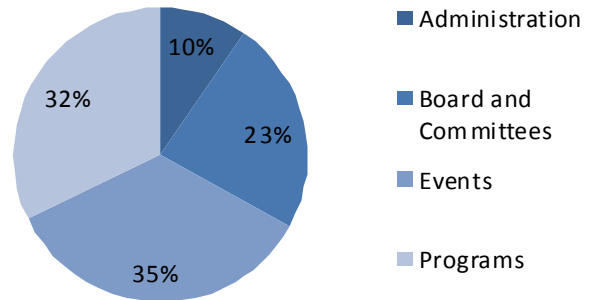
The Caring and Sharing Exchange works closely with many different agencies that either provide assistance or request assistance for their clients. During this process, we collect the names of the individuals other organizations are helping, as well as the names of the individuals who still need help. C&SE cross-references the names in order to help ensure that (a) all clients in need are matched with an organization providing assistance, and (b) no client is being helped by more than one organization. By running these "duplication checks," we endeavour to ensure that assistance is distributed evenly within the community and that everyone applying for assistance receives it.

THANK YOU FOR SHARING TIME: THE VOLUNTEER REPORT

Volunteers are a vital part of the Caring and Sharing Exchange. They vary in age and come from all walks of life. Without their support, we would not be able to achieve our mission of assisting families and individuals in need in our community. A total of 2,494 hours were contributed by 316 volunteers in 2012-2013. Volunteers gave their time to help with various activities ranging from being on the Board of Directors and various committees, to helping with envelope stuffing for our donor mail-outs and gift vouchers, data entry of client referrals, toy centre phone calls, hamper packing and delivery, sorting school supplies, general office administration, and at fundraising events.

EVERY NICKEL, EVERY DIME: THE FUNDRAISING REPORT

The Caring and Sharing Exchange is very thankful for the generosity of our individual donors as well as our corporate and community supporters.

As we do not receive any government funding, donations made by individuals, campaigns, businesses, churches, and service clubs through direct mail remain our largest source of funding followed by donations received and designated to the specific programs, revenue generated from special events and grants received from foundations.

Highlights of our annual fundraising events included the following:

OTTAWA'S BIGGEST BAKE SALE

The 12th annual Ottawa's Biggest Bake Sale was held on October 5, 2012 at Billings Bridge Shopping Centre with TD Canada Trust as the presenting sponsor once again. With the participation of nine groups and 15 bakeries, the event was a huge success, **raising over \$6,600**, which was an increase of 12% from previous year. A \$500 gift card donated by Billings Bridge Shopping Centre was raffled off as well, which added to the overall success of the event.

PENNIES FOR PORTIONS AND READY TO ROLL

The 17th annual Pennies for Portions campaign saw various schools participate by collecting and donating pennies and other loose coins to help families and individuals in need through the Christmas Exchange Program. For the Sharing in Student Success

program, the Ready to Roll campaign was created in 2012 and took on the same role by having schools participate by collecting spare change to help economically disadvantaged children in need of school essentials. The combined total amount raised by both campaigns was **\$1,329.00**.



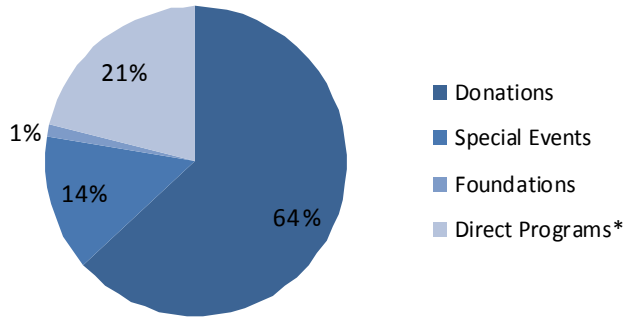

RUNNING ON EMPTIES

The 25th annual Running on Empties campaign for the Christmas Exchange program was held on December 15, 2012. The event had over 95 volunteers including some city councillors who helped collect empty beer and wine bottles at 21 Beer Stores in the Ottawa area. Even a few Beer Stores outside of Ottawa contributed donations to the event. For the 25th anniversary, the ambitious goal was to raise \$25,000, nearly \$8,000 more than the previous year. With the tremendous support of the Beer Store, volunteers, and most of all, the general public who donated their empties, we managed to not only achieve, but also to surpass our goal and **raised over \$26,600**. Since it started in 1988 the event has raised over **\$320,700** to help families and individuals in need at Christmas. We are grateful for the Beer Store and their continued support.

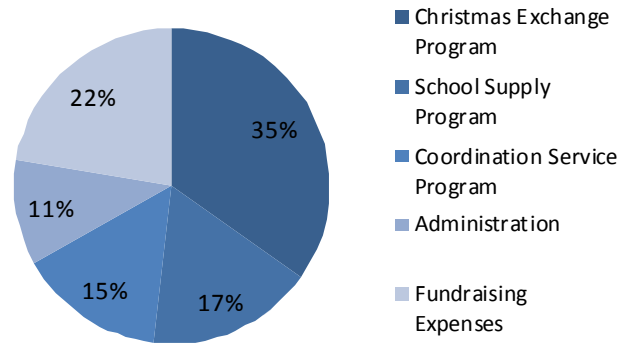
FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT
